

As Dr. Seuss once wrote, "The more that you read, the more things you will know. The more that you learn, the more places you'll go." Diving into a good book opens up a whole world of knowledge starting from a very young age. Exposure to vocabulary through reading (particularly reading children's books) not only leads to higher scores on reading tests, but also higher scores on general tests of intelligence for children. Plus, stronger early reading skills may mean higher intelligence later in life.

It can boost your brainpower.

Not only does regular reading help make you smarter, but it can also actually increase your brainpower. Just like going for a jog exercises your body, reading regularly improves memory function by giving your brain a good workout. With age comes a decline in memory and brain function, but regular reading may help slow the process, keeping minds sharper longer, according to research.

Reading can make you more empathetic.

Getting lost in a good read can make it easier for you to relate to others. Fiction, specifically, has the power to help its readers understand what others are thinking by reading other people's emotions, according to research. The impact is much more significant on those who read fiction as opposed to those who read nonfiction. "Understanding others' mental states is a crucial skill that enables the complex social relationships that characterise human societies," David Comer Kidd and Emanuele Castano wrote of their findings.

Reading can help you relax.

There's a reason snuggling up with a good book (perhaps with a good cup of tea?) after a long day sounds so appealing. Research suggests that reading can work as a serious stressbuster. One 2009 study by Sussex University researchers showed that reading may reduce stress by as much as 68%.

"It really doesn't matter what book you read, by losing yourself in a thoroughly engrossing book you can escape from the worries and stresses of the everyday world and spend a while exploring the domain of the author's imagination," cognitive neuropsychologist David Lewis told The Telegraph.

Don't forget that school has a library with a wonderful variety of books and is always accepting of readers and people who need a quiet space for homework.

But remember... be quiet.

Reading before bed can help you sleep.

Reading a real book helps you relax more than zoning out in front of a screen before bed. Screens like e-readers and tablets can keep you awake longer and even hurt your sleep. That applies to kids too: fifty-four percent of children sleep near a small screen, and clock 20 fewer minutes of shut eye on average because of it, according to research published in Paediatrics. So, reach for the literal page-turners before switching off the light.

Did you know? According to research conducted in 2023, the average screen time for users around the world aged 16 to 64 – across different platforms and devices – is 6 hours 37 minutes per day.

Reading is contagious.

75% percent of parents wish their children would read more for fun, and those who want to encourage their children to become bookworms can start by reading out loud at home.

While most parents stop reading out loud after their children learn to do it on their own, a report from Scholastic suggests that reading out loud to kids throughout their primary school years may inspire them to become frequent readers—meaning kids who read five to seven days per week for fun.

More than 40% of frequent readers ages 6 to 11 were read to out loud at home, but only 13% of those who did not read often for fun were. Translation? Storytime offers a good way to spark an interest in the hobby.



### **EGGS-PERT EGG REVIEWS**

#### Nestlé Smarties Easter Egg

Box Appeal- Overall, this packaging has a good eye-catching ability and very bright colours! However, it's interior gold foil wrapping was said to be distasteful and somewhat cheap. 6/10

Bonus Items- There was a distinct lack of smarties inside the egg, which many agreed that (if there were more) they would have been the highlight of this purchase. 3/10 Crackability- Grace 'The Cracker' Kearney stated that this egg 'could not cope with excessive force,' almost exploding under pressure and leaving our chief egg-opener with very 'chocolatey knuckles'. 5/10

The Egg- We were left slightly disappointed that the chocolate in the egg wasn't the same as (and didn't taste as good as) the Smarties. Therefore, the egg itself can't be given a greater score than 3/10

Value for Money- It cost £1.50 for this purchase, so although the quality wasn't amazing, we agreed that it was good value for money. 8/10 Overall Judgement 4/10

#### Thorntons Milk Chocolate Dinosaur Easter Egg

Box Appeal- This box showed a true-to-life image of the egg which although initially was great when buying the egg, turned out to be not so great as it took away from the excitement when it first emerged out the box. There was a complete absence of interior packaging, leaving it exposed to potential threats. 3/10

Bonus Items- There were no bonus items. Egg-stremely disappointed. 0/10

Crackability- Due to its questionable softness, there was limited wow factor when struck. Yet the dinosaur on the front managed to stay intact, which was a relief to many. 5/10

The Egg- Other than the cool dinosaur on the front, this egg was bare! The taste made up for this, however, as it was classic delicious Thorntons chocolate. 7/10

Value for Money-There was an air of dissatisfaction, which gave me the impression that this egg was not worth the £5 that was paid for it. 4/10 Overall Judgement 6/10





#### Maltesers Milk Chocolate Easter Egg

Box Appeal- This iconic red packaging is egg-ceptional as not only does it show us EGGS-ACTLY what you eggs-pect get in the box, but also is said to be the most eye-catching colour. Miss Henson was certainly impressed by the little basket that the egg was delivered in, but the gold foil, yet again, was not very appealing.

Bonus Items- Just as we expected, the bag of Maltesers in the bottom was substantial and delicious. These deserve no less than a 10/10 Crackability- When it struck Grace's forehead, the egg dented rather than cracked, possibly due to the temperature of T5. However, this result was still rather underwhelming. 2/10

The Egg- Overall, this egg got good reviews, partially because the chocolate actually tasted like Maltesers and so we believed that it deserved recognition for its integrity. However, the taste of it was deemed not as delicious as the Thorton's Dinosaur Egg. 5/10

Value for Money- As a general consensus, this was a bargain, at £1.50, and absolutely it would be bought again. 9/10 Overall Judgement 5.5/10

#### Specially Selected Ruby and Raspberry Geometric Egg

Box Appeal- We decided that this box was the most striking out of the eggs that we reviewed, which gave us very high expectations of the interior. Mr Springett's jealousy over not being chosen to model the egg in the photos that we captured, should tell you just how pretty this box was. 8/10

Bonus Items- Yet again, there were no extra treats, although due to the glamour of the egg, this wasn't particularly picked up on by our professional taste testers. 3/10

The Egg- This egg was certainly unique, as it had a large sharp point which almost protruded through the top of the box! It was agreed that if in the wrong hands, it could definitely take someone's eye out. Collectively, we decided that it tasted cheap and sweet and therefore, not to our liking; not to mention that it was smaller, and not to scale with the image on the side of the box. 2/10

Crackability- Due to this egg becoming a safety hazard, we chose to just bash it off the table. It was discovered that this was rather difficult to snap, but instead just was soft and folded under pressure. 4/10

Value for money- Because of the general dislike of this egg, the majority decided that we definitely wouldn't buy this egg again, especially at the £4 that was originally paid for it.

Overall judgement 2.5/10





#### Aldi's Milk Ripple Egg with Honeycomb and Pretzel

Box Appeal- This box will have you scrambling to get these off of the shelves with its appeasing colour scheme, although Mr Springett was seemingly unimpressed by the tacky Sellotape which made the box hard to open. Despite this, it gives off a luxurious kinda vibe, which is especially good considering the price. 8/10 Bonus Items- We thought that the egg by itself was sufficient enough to satisfy, but I reckon an extra chocolatey surprise wouldn't have gone amiss. 5/10 The Egg- To our surprise, it was a completely different shape which sparked our interests but appeared to be much thinner than every other egg we reviewed. Also, there were swirls of white chocolate on only one side which is pure laziness if you ask me. However, the egg itself was absolutely beautiful in both taste and texture. It was flavoursome and salty but not overpowering, which leads me to rate this nothing less than a 9/10

Crackability- It was extremely satisfying to watch this Easter egg being karate chopped 10/10

Value for money- At £5, it was deemed the best value for money overall, albeit more expensive than others, as all said they would buy again. 9/10

Overall judgement 9/10

#### Handcrafted Golden Blond Chocolate Egg by M&S

Box Appeal- This box certainly attracted the attention of our chocolate testers and we quickly assumed that this was going to be the most popular of all. There was sufficient interior packaging to protect the egg appropriately so when it came out of the box, it looked exactly as advertised on the packaging, if not bigger in real life! 9/10

Bonus items- the team of testers eggs-pressed their disappointment at the lack of bonus items, especially considering the price that was paid. 3/10

The egg- It was decided that it would have been better if it were smaller, as it was slightly sickly and therefore couldn't be consumed all at once (devastating, I know). Regardless, the taste was good, and the presentation was exquisite. 8/10

Crackability- When separated, it made an unforeseen, yet very satisfying pop. 7/10

Value for money- In spite of the mainly positive reviews, it wasn't agreed that it was worth £12 as it wasn't considered 8x better than Maltesers and smarties. 4/10

Overall Judgement 7/10

## This month in history...

1917


It is reported that the "bear" strikes Mrs Hooper three times then contorts the poor woman's body into a circular shape before rolling her down the stairs and out of sight. Her terrified friends and family stood cowering for 15 minutes fearing the worst and praying for deliverance as a smell of sulphur and glow of fire drifted up the stairs.

Suddenly, Margaret screamed and ran back upstairs to the window. Simultaneously, a large fire and accompanying black smoke enshrouds the village, the smoke shifts, spirals and take the shape of the great bear, reaching out to the window ledge where its desired prey stood quivering.

Just as this demonic creature stretches up to the ledge the candle on the bedside table burns with an unearthly brightness and an angle with the face of a young girl took form and commanded the creature to be gone. The bear, repelled by the light, retreated just as swiftly as it had arisen.
